## Spring Message

Greetings to all of our friends of Ogichi Daa Kwe! Spring is fast approaching the great northwoods and the staff and Board of Directors of Ogichi are busy preparing for our first official camp season! We have made substantial progress over the last several months and I want to take just a moment to update you on the work of The Board and our strategic plan for 2005.

What comes first the chicken or the egg? The Board kept asking a similar question – property or people – where do we invest first? Given the work involved with a start-up organization, we quickly came to the conclusion to strategically focus on people first. We needed a director who could devote full-time attention on the development of the 2005 season, recruit talented counselors and focus on the success of the camp long term. Thanks to Kathy Dix, Ogichi now has some of the best and most talented staff in the camping business for this coming summer!

Our next short term objective was to secure a base of operation for '05 while continuing our search for a permanent camp. The Camping and Education Foundation and our friends at Kooch-i-ching stepped in and

graciously offered a temporary solution by leasing Rainy Lake Lodge to Ogichi for our short season this year. Both Kooch-i-ching and Ogichi have worked together beautifully to make this happen without disruption or interference to either camp season or events.

Our last strategic focus for '05 is raising funds for our short-term and long-term operations. We are still raising money for the 2005 calendar year and have our goal set for at least \$2 million in order to purchase and develop a base camp.

Our board continues to evolve as our needs change and as interest grows in the camping community. We are delighted to announce our latest addition - Marian Walsh! Many

of you from Kooch-i-ching know Marian from valuable work she did in operations on Deer Island for eight summers and her work on the board. Marian's expertise will be put to great use again this summer as she helps Kathy out with our base camp. Welcome, Marian!

Finally, thanks to many of you, we are approaching a full season of 50 participants who will venture out on canoe trips this summer. On behalf of the the Board of Direc-

tors, I would like to thank all of you for your encouragement, enthusiasm and support for what will be the premier camp offering wilderness tripping experiences for strong-spirited women!

## 2005 Season Update – Kathy Dix

Come June 22, The Camping and Education Foundation's mainland base property in International Falls, Rainy Lake Lodge, will be populated with a new breed of camper – FEMALE! Ogichi Daa Kwe's first official season launches a new chapter in C&EF history. Ogichi Daa Kwe will welcome 14 CITs, 24 campers, 10 staff and several very excited founding board members to be part of this highly anticipated first camp season.

One of the differences between Kooch-iching and Ogichi Daa Kwe is the age of the camp population. As a "virtual" camp, one without a permanent base camp, our initial efforts are focused on developing our tripping program with an older group of girls capable of handling longer trips and tougher portages, young women who will help to establish the Ogichi culture and traditions. Our camp experience targets ages 13-21 year olds, and offers a program unlike many of the established camps for ages 8-16. Accordingly, most of our staff are veterans of wilderness camping in their late twenties, teachers and year-round tripping guides.

Because we are focusing on developing leadership for Ogichi's future, we have two tracks for young women this summer who will be 16 – 21 years old. The CIT track offers certification courses and leadership

training for those interested in future staff positions, while the camper track offers a straightforward wilderness tripping experience with an in-camp program designed to prepare for, and commemorate the trip and its personal value. Additionally this allows a choice between a 3 1/2-week and 2 1/2-week time commitment.

Ogichi Daa Kwe is delighted be able to initiate a scholarship program this season made possible through donations generously given to the Ogichi Scholarship Fund. Half of our scholarship campers will come through a partnership with Summer Search, a national program that focuses on identifying and developing leadership potential and character in low income high school students. A demanding selection process identifies students that demonstrate a resiliency in overcoming hardship and the desire to help others. 93% of Summer Search students go to college and 89% of them graduate from college. It is a privilege for Ogichi to be selected to provide the wilderness experience component of their curriculum. We welcome the geographic, religious and cultural diversity.

With only a month and a half until we pack our duffels and head up north, it's now time to get some serious momentum going in personal work-outs as well as getting travel and medical forms filled out. I recently pulled my gear out of the dry sack and enjoyed

smelling the smoky scent of last year's campfires. I love that our sense of smell so quickly transports us to another time and place. The excitement to see friends from last summer's inaugural trip is at a peak. For those that have made a commitment to join us this summer, we are so excited to have your pioneering spirits a part of Ogichi.

And for those of you who haven't but would like to come up and go out on a trip with us, we have a few more camper spots open for this summer.

As a member of the Association for Experiential Education (AEE), Natanya has a strong commitment to experiential education.



**Henry Bangert**, also known as Hank, worked at Camp Kooch-I-Ching from 1996-2003. He worked as a Trip Head and was also promoted to Department Head of

woodsmanship/woodcraft. As a graduate of Bowdoin College, Brunswick, ME, Hank was active in the Outing Club, leading numerous trips from 1997-2001. He also served as Bowdoin's Leadership Training Instructor from 1998-2001 and their Lead Whitewater Canoe Instructor from 1999-2001. He specialized in canoeing, whitewater, survival/primitive skills training, and winter camping/mountaineering. Hank was a trip leader for Ogichi's inaugural canoe trip last summer and will be returning to head the Counselor-In-Training component of our summer session. **Lauren Whaley** comes to us as a graduate of Bowdoin College as well. She also was very involved in the Outing Club there,

where she led numerous whitewater and flatwater canoe trips, cross-country ski trips and day and weekend hiking trips. Lauren has also participated in a 30-day NOLS trip of whitewater canoeing and desert hiking. As well as being a freelance writer, Lauren's most involved work with teens, was her work at the YMCA Camp Widjiwagan, in Ely, MN where she solo and co-lead a number



of canoe expeditions on the Albany River, in Ontario and in the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness, MN. Her most prestigious trip was a solo led 45-day Arctic canoe expedition on the Back River, Nunavut. We are most excited to have this strong spirited woman as a Trip Head for this summer session.

**Melynda Roscoe**, our camp nurse, will serve two functions. Melynda, a University of NH graduate, will be our nurse during the Counselor in Training (CIT) session and the in-camp session and will be a Co-Trip Head on one of the Turtle River trips. This strong spirited woman has two bachelor degrees in both Social Work and Kinesiology: Outdoor Education, making her well-rounded for working with young women and able to handle a multitude of situations. Melynda, a registered Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) and Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) instructor and Lifeguard instructor, has led many trips throughout CA, NH and ME working with diverse populations and working year round. For 4 summers, Melynda has also worked for Camp Hawthorne, in ME as an Assistant Director and Trip Leader giving her the experience of both administrative work and field work. Melynda also has a strong commitment to service as she worked for AmeriCorps as a team leader and member. She was involved with Habitat for Humanity in Georgia; Open Space, Easter Seals, Sojourner Experiential School, Title School in Colorado, and Big Springs Residential Youth Ranch in Texas. Her medical experience comes from a Wilderness Therapy Program where she served as a medic for over a year. 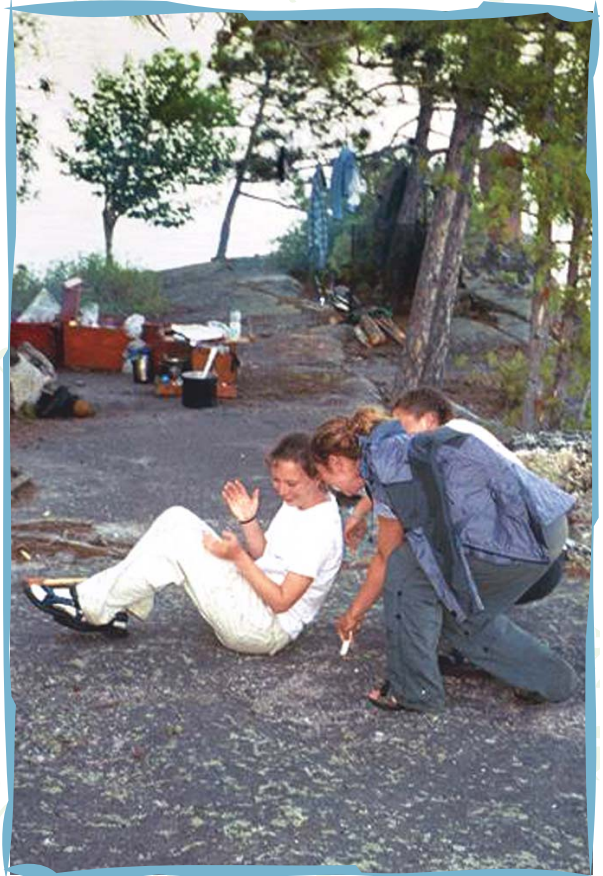
“You can’t be taught the stuff you learn on the trip. It’s just by experience.” – Sydney

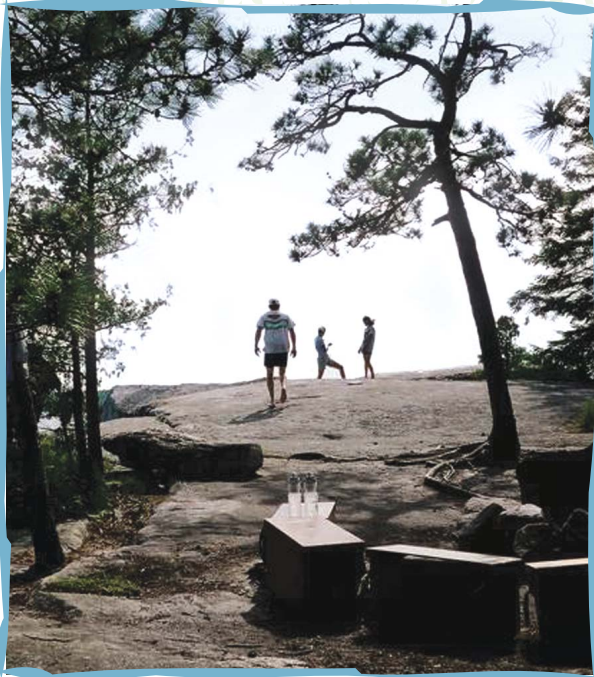

# Ogichi Permanent Base Camp **Site Search** - Jeff Patterson

## Continues to Make Progress But A Major Challenge Remains

Location! Location! Location! ... That is the old real estate adage and it is just as important to Ogichi Daa Kwe as it would be to anyone buying a house or locating a business. Members of the Site Search Committee continued to scour northern Minnesota over the winter and spring of 2004-2005 for available base camp site opportunities. Jeff Patterson, Ogichi board member and Minneapolis realtor, has now previewed over 90 site candidates and presented more than a dozen properties for serious Board consideration.

Most recently, Jeff uncovered a financially strapped resort property on Big Wolf Lake near Bemidji, Minnesota, approximately 100 miles south of International Falls. This past March, Jeff and an advance team of site experts, including George Simmons, Richard Thompson and Jerry Bergvall, inspected the property. Their first impression was that the property had more potential to adequately accommodate our camp operation than anything we've seen over the last year-and-a-half. Specifically, the resort on Big Wolf Lake offered an 80-acre site that was only about 30% developed (thus plenty of room for growth), over 900 linear feet of attractive, usable shoreline,

16 separate residential cabins capable of immediately housing the campers and staff, an attractive owner/director's cabin and an extensive inventory of personal property than could be purchased with the property, including motor boats, pontoon boats, sail boats, and canoes ... all at a relatively affordable price of around \$1.0 million.

However, the stubborn challenge that continues to hinder the Site Search Committee is the lack of financial ability/strength in the present Ogichi constituency to seriously commit to a specific acquisition opportunity on a timely basis. Jeff's advance team estimated that it would likely require \$1.5 to \$2.0 million to acquire the Bemidji property and make the necessary improvements and alterations so Ogichi could feasibly be in business on the site. To conquer this challenge, WE NEED YOUR HELP! We need to either a.) raise this volume of capital through one or more major donations or b.) assemble a partnership of substantial investors who will help us buy such a property and lease it back to the Ogichi LLC for a period of years while we complete a more patient capital campaign to pay back the investor partnership.

This is our most formidable challenge for Ogichi. New, fresh capital needs to be raised. It certainly is not a lack of market demand for this camping concept. The inaugural 2004 canoe trip and the capacity enrollment for 2005 have answered that question. It certainly is not a lack of outstanding leadership and staff. Elsewhere in this newsletter, you will read that Kathy Dix has assembled an exceptionally qualified and experienced staff of program directors, counselors, trip heads, and CITs' to lead Ogichi into its first real camping season. The positive forward momentum for Ogichi is now rolling and it will not be stopped.

Nevertheless, the site search continues to challenge us and we need a substantial amount of capital to conquer it. Ogichi ultimately needs its own permanent home, distant and separate from the boys' operation. We need your help. ## Fund Raising is Key to Ogichi Daa Kwe Growth

As our girls' camp, Ogichi Daa Kwe, "climbs the hill", fund raising is of major importance. Our tuition does not cover half of the summer costs, so we need extra help. We must raise \$250,000 this year to break even, and these monies are basically for operating costs. Yes, you can give us a big lift.

We are revamping the kitchen at the girl's temporary base camp (old Rainy Lake Lodge). The kitchen equipment at the lodge is not suitable for food preparation. We will be purchasing new kitchen equipment which will go with us when we locate a permanent campsite for Ogichi Daa Kwe.

There is a lot of camping gear and materials needed for this summer. We have a "wish list" that follows this article. Please look at these items and help us in these areas - all consideration is very much appreciated.

## Rainy Lake Lodge Base Camp

Rainy Lake Lodge, affectionately known by many as RLL, is situated on the mainland in Franks Bay, one half mile south of the Deer Island base for Camp Kooch-i-ching and will serve as the summer home for the 40 Ogichi campers in 2005. Rainy Lake Lodge, while now known as the new Heinle's Landing and mainland base for Kooch, is a long time landmark on Rainy Lake where countless Kooch families have resided since the middle forties while visiting their sons at the end of the summer season.

The Camping and Education Foundation purchased the lodge in the winter of 2003. Former owners had let the property languish over the past 15 years, but the main lodge building with kitchen, dining room, living room, bar and eight motel style rooms on the second floor is still a safe and sturdy structure. Eight family style cabins, all with a lake view and indoor plumbing, have also weathered well through the years and will provide a pleasant home for Ogichi Daa Kwe girls.

Renovations of the main lodge are underway this spring, including all "new" kitchen appliances and dining ware, patching plumbing fixtures and window screens and dressing up the living and dining areas with new carpet. Similar "fix ups" will be made to the cabins.
